With the greater availability of high-grade marijuana around the country, connoisseurs of marijuana have found new ways to extract THC for even greater highs. One of these methods is the Butane Hash Oil (BHO) process. By introducing butane into the extraction process, the end result can be deadly. BHO labs are exploding and causing injuries throughout the nation, particularly in regions with lax (or none) marijuana laws. BHO labs have their own unique set of investigative techniques: from safe handling of the scene, to evidence collection, to special laws to prosecute these cases. During this course, we will debrief an incident that occurred in Livermore, CA in which a BHO lab being done in an apartment exploded killing one. The case agent will go over how the incident was investigated: from what occurred with the first responding officers, to the arrest of the culprits for murder, and on to a conviction for manslaughter. We will review what went right and what went wrong. Fire Department personnel are encouraged to attend as we will cover aspects important for their response and investigation.

After completing the course, the student will:

- Understand the different types of hashish and, specifically, what hashish is and is not.
- Understand the process, step by step, of how to make butane hash oil
- · Know what types of manufacturing processes are going to replace the butane method of extraction
- Know the history of BHO and other types of hashish extraction
- Have an understanding of THC content and how it relates to being high
- · Learn the dangers of these types of labs and the tasks needed to be completed for an investigation
- Review successful cases where BHO manufacturers were prosecuted and convicted
